

## **Peer Review What?**

An Interreg Europe Policy Learning Platform Peer Review is half-ayear process that culminates in a two-day session in which

- you look at your regional policy challenge
- together with a group of carefully selected peers with relevant experience
- facilitated by PLP Platform experts
- with relevant local stakeholders involved

The **objective** is to give you advice, recommendations and an **action plan** to resolve your challenge.

During the peer review, you will get:

- An in-depth analysis of your policy challenge
- An exchange of experience with relevant policymakers
- A presentation of potential solutions

## Peer Review: to Whom?

For Regional Authorities and actors, currently involved – **or not involved!** – in Interreg projects

With a policy challenge that can be clearly stipulated and has a wider relevance (transferability)

Ready to be open-minded and honest in their engagement

Ability and motivation to infuse recommendations



## **Peer Review: The Process**

- → Identification of a policy challenge
- **→** Application
- → Thematic bgr paper with additional materials
- → Selection of Peers
- → Setting up date & agenda for the session
- → Preparation & exchange of session materials
- → Peer Review session w/ initial recommendations
- → Recovery from the session ;-)

- → Final recommendations
- → Final report
- → Post-closure interview with summary doc
- → Eternal follow-up with PLP and Peers



## Peer Review: The Päijät-Häme Case

*Scope of the Review:* 

Regional Innovation Governance – State of Play and Challenges

#### *Main questions from the host:*

How to keep things in check? Or is there even a need to do that? / How to coordinate actions to optimise resources and outcomes? / Role play: who does what, responsibilities? / Value chains and money flows / Levels: organisation, city, local, region, national, EU, global / Direction: vertical, horizontal, 3D / Communication tools, platforms, practices / Balance between governance structure (rigidity) and open innovation (agility): how to manage & govern processes and avoid "waste" -and still maintain bottom-up agility? / Project-driven innovation development vs. "normal" RDI activities – is there a difference or is there even an issue? / Definition and meaning of RDI to different actors? / Community engagement: at what level? Citizens, companies, authorities, 3rd sector... engagement takes resources, which are away from something else – what's a good balance? / How to engage smaller companies –"The man with the van" to bottom-up grassroot innovation processes? Or is this even needed?



... And about 468 sub-questions ;-)

Highly professional touch


Peers were really peers
